Commission on Opticianry Accreditation Summer 2009 Update on activities

In April 2009 the Commission held its semi-annual meeting in Durham, North Carolina. Among the items accomplished at this meeting:

Reaffirmation of accreditation was granted to:

The Ophthalmic Science program at Camden County College in Blackwood, NJ.

The Vision Care Technology program at Tyler Junior College in Tyler, TX.

The Ophthalmic Dispensing Program at TCI College of Technology, in New York City, NY.

The Commissioners congratulate the program directors and faculty on their excellent programs.

Annual reports and progress reports from nine programs were reviewed for compliance with the *Essentials* reporting requirements.

The *Essentials* for the Laboratory Certificate programs was reviewed, and is now available for comment by any interested parties. If you would like to review the proposed changes to this document, please contact the COA Director.

A change was made to the *Essentials* for the Opticianry degree program, to bring this document into compliance with a requirement of CHEA (Council for Higher Education Accreditation). This change requires that the accredited programs publish program outcomes. By September 1, 2009, all programs must report to the COA on how they are implementing this requirement. A second change to this document was discussed, and will be addressed at the fall meeting by the *Essentials* committee.

The Commissioners reviewed the COA mission statement, and adopted the following: "The mission of the COA is to foster excellence in opticianry education by setting standards, assessing educational effectiveness, and identifying those academic programs that meet the standards, in order to aid programs to produce competent graduates who will provide professional services to the public." The Commissioners will be reviewing the goals and objectives at the fall meeting.

Jayne Weinberger, Chair, Thomas Blair Jr., Vice Chair, and Amy Lewis, Treasurer, were reelected for an additional 1 year term.

The next meeting of the Commission will be in Durham NC in October 2009.

Commission on Opticianry Accreditation Summer 2009 Update on activities

Other updates:

There are three reaffirmation of accreditation visits scheduled for 2009, and one initial accreditation visit.

The Commission continues with its application for recognition by CHEA (Council for Higher Education Accreditation). CHEA took over the 'quality assurance' role that the US Department of Education dropped about 10 years ago. CHEA is now the organization of choice for accrediting agencies that do not need recognition by the US Department of Education for federal funding. Information about CHEA, including those regional and programmatic accrediting agencies that it recognizes, is available at http://CHEA.org.

The Commission's website is currently undergoing updating. Among the changes is a "donate" button allowing donations through PayPal directly to the Commission.

The Commission continues to request financial support from the eye care community, individuals, companies, and societies. Over the past year the Commission has received donations from a variety of eyecare companies and organizations, including NAO, OAA, NFOS; and many individuals. Vision Care Technology Celebrates 40th Anniversary

The Department of Vision Care Technology at New York City College of Technology celebrated 40 years of excellence in opticianry education on March 26, 2009, at an on-campus alumni reunion attended by more than 200 department graduates, students, faculty, staff and other guests. The event was held in conjunction with the National Federation of Opticianry Schools annual meeting and the preliminary National Federation of Opticianry Schools College Bowl that attracted participation by students from 16 opticianry schools nationwide.

Following an afternoon lecture, "Optics and People, Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow," by Dr. Joseph Bacotti, Jr., the evening festivities began with the presentation by Danne Ventura of Essilor of America and City Tech Vision Care Technology Instructor Thomas Woods of a gift collection of rare ophthalmic textbooks from the estate of the late Irwin Vogel. Mr. Vogel was an adjunct lecturer at the College before becoming the program director at Cañada College in California. This fine collection of books will be placed in custodianship in City Tech's Ursula C. Scherwin Library.

Department Chair Robert Russo, who served as master of ceremonies, then presented Edward Rauch, the last surviving founding member of the department, with a Lifetime Achievement Award in recognition of his lifetime of service in opticianry and his dedication in the development of what originally was called the Department of Ophthalmic Dispensing. Professor Russo also paid tribute to Professor Joseph Bacotti, founding father of the department, who together with Dr. Alvin Schiff, Professor Donald Evans, Professor James Coleman, Mr. John Williams and Mr. Rauch established a strong and vibrant program that has produced many of New York City and the nation's top vision care technology professionals.

City Tech Student Selah Brown Wins First Prize in College Bowl

Selah Brown, 19, a senior majoring in vision care technology at City Tech, walked away with the \$500 first prize in the National Federation of Opticianry (NFOS) Schools College Bowl. The win brings him one step closer to his goal of building recreation centers in the communities in which he lives and works.

This was the second time in three years that City Tech won the top prize, beating out students from colleges in Connecticut, Florida, New Jersey, Georgia, New York, Tennessee, Massachusetts, Virginia, Washington State, and British Columbia.

The competition was held at the International Vision Expo at the Jacob Javits Center in Manhattan. Sponsored by Essilor of America, the event is modeled on the television show "Jeopardy" and features questions in anatomy and physiology, ophthalmic dispensing, ophthalmic fabrication, contact lenses and optics.

Brown, a Rosebank, Staten Island resident, will use the prize money to help pay for the state licensing exam, New York State Board for Ophthalmic Dispensing Practical. After he graduates from City Tech, he will attend Brooklyn College where he will major in biology in order to satisfy the pre-requisites for optometry school.

"Eventually, I want to own my own business in the optical field, maybe a couple of stores in Brooklyn and Staten Island," he says. "But most importantly, I want to run a business that gives back to the community."

Eighteen Winning Entries Promote an Understanding of Healthy Sight


